If you have tuned in to 790 The Zone

recently during the Red Zone hoping to hear from the 2 Live Stews, odds are you have not been able to hear from Doug or Ryan. With the Stews' contracts expiring later this year, the station decided to take them off the air, likely for good. Rumors have been circulating that the Stews are interested in heading to the new sports talk station which will debut sometime in October on 92.9 FM. However, according to a story in the AJC, the Zone is exercising the six-month non-compete clause that could keep the Stews off the Atlanta airwaves until July 2013. The Stews have been with 790 The Zone for more than 11 years, bouncing from nights to afternoon drive to midday slots. Several years ago, the Stews appeared on the Sporting News Radio lineup from Atlanta, and the Stews could be seen on ESPN as well.

PEYTON'S PARTY ...

The AJC's Mark Bradley wrote a witty piece following the Falcons' big win over Peyton Manning and the Denver Broncos this past Monday on ESPN. Bradley called the Falcons "party-crashers" for ruining what ESPN was hoping would be a dominating performance by the former Super Bowl MVP.

"ESPN tried to throw a Peyton party Monday night," wrote Bradley. "Some guys wearing red almost turned it into a pity party. The Worldwide Leader sought to show the world the greatness that is Peyton Manning; the Falcons almost made you feel sorry for the old guy."

This isn't the first time a major network has come to Atlanta for a primetime night game, only to focus on the opposing quarterback. Last year when the Eagles visited on Sunday Night Football, most of NBC's leadin was centered around Michael Vick's return to Atlanta as a starting quarterback. I don't think the Falcons mind, though, as they won that game and won this past Monday. Perhaps one day the major networks will focus on Matt Ryan or Julio Jones or the Falcons. All they do is win and perhaps it is time they get their due.

Local teams having successful autumns

These past two weekends in the world of Atlanta sports have seen things that we aren't used to. The Falcons, Georgia Tech and Georgia have won each of their games the past two weekends and the Braves swept both the Mets in New York and the Nationals back at home.

Whether or not each of these teams can sustain their impressive runs as of late is another story, but one thing is for sure, there is once again reason to be excited about Atlanta sports. While the Jackets and Bulldogs took care of business handily the past two weekends, the Bulldogs notched the biggest win, going on the road to beat Missouri in the Tigers' first SEC game.

TOAST OF ATLANTA ...

The Falcons and their 2-0 start have been the talk of the town. They not only dominated the Chiefs on the road at the always tough environment of Arrowhead Stadium, but they were able to stifle Peyton Manning into throwing three first quarter interceptions and beat the Broncos on Monday Night Football.

Matt Ryan is already playing like an MVP candidate and the dynamic receiving duo of Roddy White and Julio Jones has torched secondaries, with each player having a 100-yard receiving game. Tony Gonzalez looks to be making the most of his last NFL season and his last crack at a Super Bowl title. What can't be understated is the effort of

the defense against the Broncos. While the offense certainly looked solid once again, with multiple players contributing, the defensive effort may be what people remember about the game. William Moore was outstanding with multiple big plays, including his interception of Manning that was nearly brought into the end zone, along with a sack for a 13-yard loss. The Falcons will once again have a stiff road test when they take on another AFC West opponent in the San Diego Chargers. San Diego has also gotten off to a 2-0 start, beating the Raiders and Titans.

A NEW YEAR ...

With the bad taste of last September's historic collapse, the Braves are doing everything in their power to avoid reliving 2011's disastrous end that saw them stumble out of the playoff hunt on the last day of the regular season. This month didn't get off to the best of starts as the Braves were nearly swept by the suddenly-surging Phillies, but it was a Chipper Jones' walk-off three-run homer that capped a five-run, ninth inning rally to sink Philadelphia.

That particular moment may have reignited the Braves as they took three of four from the

Rockies in Atlanta before sweeping the Mets in Chipper's last appearance in the Big Apple. After stumbling against the Brewers, there was a hint of pessimism once again as the Nationals came to town. Atlanta once again shook off a minor road block and was able to take three straight from the NL East leaders, giving them not only another boost of confidence, but also another glimmer of hope that they can catch the Nationals in the division race.

Ideally, that's the goal for the Braves, even though they do have a strong hold on the NL Wild Card lead. With a few weeks left in the regular season, you have to believe that the division title is still the objective, as they would avoid a one-game Wild Card play-in game where anything could happen. Several players have hit their strides at the right time. including Kris Medlen, who has been lights out since joining the rotation; Mike Minor, who has pitched well despite not having much run support in some outings; and even Dan Uggla, who has shown signs that he has broken out of his miserable slump. As the season comes to a close, we're definitely looking at a motivated, hungry Braves squad.

Falcons look like NFC's team to beat

he entire offseason had Falcons fans I wondering what the team would look like after the addition of a pair of new co-ordinators as well as the extremely talented Asante Samuel. Fans were excited to hear about how Jerry Rice picked Julio Jones to be his breakout star for 2012, but others took pause when Curtis Lofton left a void at middle linebacker and the team did not bring in another option at left tackle.

Through the first two games, though, the team has shown far more positives than negatives. The offense looks explosive under new coordinator Dirk Koetter after piling up 40 points on the road against the Kansas City Chiefs before returning home to put 27 points up against Denver on Monday Night Football. Matt Ryan's understanding of the new system was obvious against Kansas City when he passed for 299 yards and three scores while recording an additional score on the ground. Jones also seemed to bust out against the Chiefs with six catches for 108 yards and two scores. Ryan spread the wealth around in Game 2, finding Roddy White for eight catches and 102 yards and one score and Tony

Gonzalez for 70 yards on seven catches plus one touchdown. Koetter has plenty of toys to play with and will likely exploit teams all year by emphasizing a different weapon when opposing defenses try to take last week's playmaker away. Ryan will be required to operate the plan, but if the first two games have shown us anything, it is that Ryan, following an intense offseason training routine, is up to the challenge.

NOLAN'S IMPACT ...

Defensively, Mike Nolan's unit limited Peyton Manning to just seven points through the first three quarters while coming away with three interceptions and one fumble. The defense got to Manning three times, a high number considering how quickly Manning has gotten rid of the ball throughout his career. Nolan's defensive attack has been bringing pressure from different areas of the field as defensive tackles and a safety recorded sacks against Denver, and the defense has been disguised unlike in years past. The defensive players shift and rotate around right before the ball is snapped in an effort to con-

fuse the opposing quarterback. During the Falcons' postgame coverage, several people praised Nolan for confusing Manning with different looks and exotic packages. The three interceptions in the first quarter set the tone for the game and helped the offense put up 10 points to stick Denver in an early hole.

Nolan's defense also did a nice job adjusting to Kansas City at halftime of the season opener. The Chiefs put 17 points on the board in the first half but managed just one score coming with three minutes left in the fourth quarter during Atlanta's 40-24 win. The defense forced a missed field goal then forced a fumble, two straight interceptions and a punt to decide the game. William Moore and Stephen Nicholas recorded interceptions while sacks came from the defensive tackle spot, the end position and the linebacker spot.

MONDAY NIGHT SUCCESS ...

For the Falcons to find success against Denver this past Monday, the team had to buck history. Entering the Denver game, the Falcons owned a lifetime 9-24 record in 33 games, most recently falling to the New Orleans Saints 45-16 in 2011, the team's sixth straight loss on Monday Night Football. The team had not won on a Monday night since Dec. 12, 2005, when Atlanta hosted the Saints. The Falcons did more than just buck history though, as the team managed to rise up and snuff out Manning early. The Fal-cons' defensive secondary had many in Dirty Bird Nation worried about the loss of Brent Grimes to a season-ending Achilles injury, but the defense picked off Manning's second pass, fourth pass and eighth pass of the night. Despite being outgained by Denver, the Fal-cons should feel pleased with the effort considering the situations they put the Broncos in early on and the turnovers the defense forced.


Moving forward, the team will need to continue to use exotic packages to confuse opposing quarterbacks while continuing to take the ball away when the opportunity arises. Last year, Nolan's Dolphins defense picked off 16 passes and recovered 17 fumbles while getting to the quarterback 41 times. His squad was third in the NFL in rush defense in terms of yards, rushing scores and fumbles recovered. The year before, his Dolphins defense was ninth in the league in passing yards allowed and seventh in rushing yards allowed. He is a master strategist and Falcons fans should be expecting his calls, as part of head coach Mike Smith's overall scheme, to continue to flummox opposing offenses.

FUTURE IS OFFENSIVE ...

Radio co-hosts and national talking heads love to throw around the term "elite" when it comes to quarterbacks. Apparently, winning is the lone thing that matters for quarterbacks, unless a quarterback simply wins and it isn't pretty in the process. For his first few years under center, all Ryan did was win in the regular season. In the postseason, Ryan is 0-3, leading many to say he is nowhere near elite. However through the first two games of the season, Ryan's 117.6 passer rating is the best in the league and his five touchdown passes is tied for the tops in the league. He is also in the top 10 in completions, percentage and fewest interceptions. Should Ryan continue to hook up with Gonzalez, White, Jones and Harry Douglas, the playoff drought and the elite talk should become a moot point as his numbers will just increase.

The Falcons should also look to take the next step as far as becoming elite. Two years ago, the team earned home-field advantage throughout the NFC playoffs, only to lose at home to the Packers. It is hard to see this team falling at home in the playoffs again. While Atlanta will likely not go 16-0 as only two teams have done in the past, it would not be a shock to see the Dirty Birds win the NFC South and handle their business in the postseason. If the first two games are any indication, the Falcons will be flying high with a pair of new coordinators and an offense that looks unstoppable.

ery day at practice. Our offense played its best game thus far against Milton last Friday. The defense made a few too many mistakes to give us a chance for a victory.


We need more consistency on both sides of the ball to have a chance to win.

North Cobb, Parkview move on after big wins

Upsets happen in sports. The fans love them, the media smothers the teams involved and coaches are adored or reviled because of them.

As celebrated as they are, the hardest part about upsets is the next week. Getting a team off the canvas or down from the clouds is one of the toughest jobs even the best motivators have.

Parkview coach Cecil Flowe and North Cobb head man Shane Queen found themselves saddled with that task after their teams earned wins over No. 1 Grayson and No. 3 Walton last week.

SKY HIGH ...

Flowe's Panthers played incredible defense and upset what some were calling the nation's best team in Grayson, which had not lost since the 2010 playoffs. The 22-7 win was important for a program that had dominated the state at

times around the turn of the century in winning four state titles between 1997 and 2002, but had fallen on hard times in recent years.

"It was huge because you beat a ranked team, a nationally ranked team," said Flowe in an exclusive interview with Score. "It's a situation where my kids grow confidence. You see that on any given night, what you preach is true: you can play with anybody."

The psychology of the upset is very real. Getting players to buy into the fact that they can beat teams ranked as highly as Grayson can be a challenge. But it wasn't for Flowe, who has won 187 games in 20 years at the Lilburn school.

"You've gotta go out and play the game," he said. "That's why you don't play it on paper."

Meanwhile, Queen's squad faced a similar goliath in Walton, which had not lost a regular

season game since September of 2010. But the Warriors were not intimidated and wasted no time in grabbing a 14-0 lead before the No. 3 Raiders got off the bus.

Wide receiver Xavier Borishade returned the opening kick for a touchdown, then caught a 78-yard pass for another score, and it was all but over. Borishade went on to catch two more touchdowns and North Cobb shocked the state with a 49-17 demolition of Walton.

DOWN TO EARTH ...

Even professional teams have a tough time staying humble after an upset. Getting high school kids to stay grounded and not over-confident can be next to impossible for many coaches. But Flowe and Queen have their methods of working through that problem.

"Show 'em the film," said Flowe of how to get his team ready for its next game against Archer. "Take care of business. You just gotta go out there and play again each week. We told 'em, every week, it's going to get harder. It's not going to get easier."

That is especially true for the Panthers, who were dismissed 40-16 by the Tigers last season. And Archer may be even better this year.

"We're playing another big team this week," said Flowe. "We've got to get through this stretch."

While Parkview is already 1-0 in the region, North Cobb begins region play tonight in a game with Kennesaw Mountain. To get up for the Mustangs, Queen has a fairly direct approach for his team.

"It was a big win, but it doesn't help us get into the playoffs," said Queen. "We're 0-0 (in the region), so it's a new season now."

North Cobb defeated Kennesaw Mountain 42-17 last year, but coming off a huge win sets the Warriors up for the dreaded "hangover game."

How these two programs bounce back from monumental upsets remains to be seen. But the psychology of an upset in sports remains one of the most intriguing parts of the game.

Fulton backyard brawl goes statewide



OFFENSIVE OPTIONS ...Tech quarterback Tevin Washington put together another solid outing, gathering 93 rushing yards on 11 carries and scoring three touch-downs, while also throwing for 125 yards and a 70-yard score to Zack Laskey on the game's opening drive. The Jackets' offense was already in mid-season form, amassing an astounding 594 yards of total offense, with 461 of those yards coming on the ground. Leading the rushing attack was senior Orwin Smith, who finally got himself going after struggling to do much of anything in the team's first two games. Despite only carrying the ball six times, Smith was able to gain 137 rushing yards, with 77 of those yards accounting for the Jackets' second touchdown of the game. Freshman Vad Lee registered another

strong game, as he gathered 59 yards on the ground and two scores. Virginia simply could not stop the Jackets' early onslaught, allowing Paul Johnson's team into the end zone on its first four possessions.

HURRICANE WARNING ...

Next up for the Jackets is a home matchup against another ACC Coastal rival, the Miami Hurricanes, who despite being 2-1 and sitting atop the division, haven't made things look pretty in their first three games. Al Golden's squad had to rally to put away Boston College, were blown out at Kansas State and got off to a slow start against Bethune-Cookman. They a slow start against Bethune-Cookman. They have, however, shown recent dominance over the Jackets over the past few seasons. Miami has won the past three contests by an average mar-gin of 19 points. Tech will have to slow down the Hurricanes' rushing attack and take advantage of a Miami defense that has allowed just

Georgia Tech will have to do so without former starting B-back Charles Perkins. The former Collins Hill star has an "upper-body injury" according to Johnson and could miss the rest of the season.

The Atlanta Hawks re-signed Ivan Johnson, one of their key pieces from last season's postseason run to a new contract. The terms of the deal are undisclosed, but it is presumably a multi-year deal since this comes little over a week after Johnson signed his restricted free agent offer sheet.

Johnson provided quite the spark off the bench last season and was the rookie of the month in April when he averaged 10.7 points, 5.9 rebounds, 1.8 blocks and 1.5 steals per game in 11 appearances. Johnson was vital to the Hawks being able to overcome Al Horford's injury early in the season, and was thrust into the regular rotation and exceeded expectations. Johnson was never a great offensive weapon, but he was stellar defensively and played at a high energy level at both ends of the floor.

Scott should figure into the regular rotation as a nice bench option for Larry Drew when he needs a spark, much like Ivan Johnson last year.

The Hawks have requested waivers on Jordan Williams, who was acquired this offseason from the Nets in the Joe Johnson trade. Williams did not figure much into the Hawks plans this season, and, by placing him on waivers, the Hawks cleared room for Johnson.

The current roster features 13 players, which leaves two open spots to be filled in training camp come October. The guard slots are filled up with seven guards on the roster currently and power forward slots are filled as well. True small forwards are the glaring omission from this Hawks team which means they will likely look to get two wing players in training camp to add to the final 15-man roster.
