More use of the "No Respect" card

One might believe that Atlanta sports fans have listening to Rodney Dangerfield comedy albums non-stop this autumn after playing the "No Respect" card yet again this past Monday. After weeks of whining that the Atlanta Falcons aren't getting the respect from national football writers, now online bloggers and talk radio callers are complaining that the University of Georgia is not getting any respect after last weekend's series of upsets.

The Georgia Bulldogs, ranked No. 5 entering the weekend, dispatched Georgia Southern, then sat back and watched as No. 1 Kansas State and No. 2 Oregon lost. The Bulldogs were the new No. 3 team in the new BCS poll last Sunday night with just Notre Dame

and Alabama ahead of them. The Dawgs, in all likelihood, will face the Crimson Tide for the SEC title in the Georgia Dome, meaning that if the Dawgs win out, they will play for a national title. However, ESPN only called Alabama and Notre Dame the real "winners" of the shakedown last Saturday. This did not sit well with Bulldog Nation. The Dawg fans were rabid, calling in and wondering why Georgia wasn't receiving the love.

Being a Georgia alumnus, I have to say that ANYONE calling up and complaining about Georgia not getting any love is making the rest of us look bad. Georgia controls its own destiny. Simply beat Georgia Tech and then Alabama and the numbers will put the Dawgs in the national title game, period. I

would prefer Georgia to fly under the radar ala 2005 when UGA stomped LSU for the SEC crown. Falcons, Jackets using bizarre ways to win

How bad were the Falcons last Sunday in the Georgia Dome against the Arizona Cardinals? Historically bad, but in a good way, if that makes sense. Matt Ryan became the first quarterback since Bart Starr in 1967 throw five interceptions in one game and still come out on the winning end. Despite committing six turnovers in total, losing the give-away-takeaway battle by five and rushing for an abysmal 58 yards, the Falcons found a way to prevail 23-19.

Belying its 9-1 record, Atlanta has by no means played its best football. The Falcons aren't peaking right now and don't appear to be anywhere close. But as recent postseasons have taught us, it's all about getting hot at the right time. The Falcons may be able to do just that come January; and if they can do it with

home-field advantage throughout the NFC playoffs, even better.

"As a quarterback, you don't ever want to have those kinds of games," Ryan said in his postgame press conference following his disaster against the Cardinals. "But they happen. It's just about how you respond to that and what you keep doing. I think it says a lot about our football team that I made a lot of mistakes, but I'm still surrounded by 52 guys on the active roster that show up and make plays. ... I'm just glad that we still won."

A lot—both good and bad—can be said about these Atlanta Falcons. What has to be said, though, is that they simply, sometimes inexplicably, know how to win football games.

CHAMPIONSHIP-BOUND ...

It can be argued that not a single one of this state's three major football teams (the Falcons, Georgia and Georgia Tech) is playing championship-caliber football. The Falcons lost to a 3-5 New Orleans team on Nov. 11 then did whatever it was they were doing against Arizona. Georgia Tech may be in the midst of a three-game winning streak, but it is still a disappointing 6-5 overall with losses to Middle Tennessee and BYU. Georgia has won five in a row to improve to 10-1, but it will never be able to erase a 35-7 humiliation at South Carolina from its resume.

For all their faults, however egregious they may be, all three teams are in contention for championships. While the Falcons are farther away from their destination due to number of games remaining, Georgia and Georgia Tech have already booked spots in their respective conference title games (although in the Jackets' case it's more like they backed into it via Miami's bowl ban).

With the way the two SEC division champions are playing right now, perhaps Alabama should not have been the one rioting in the streets when losses by Kansas State and Oregon paved a direct path to the BCS National Championship. Since their loss to the Gamecocks, Georgia has a win over Florida and blowout victories against Ole Miss, Auburn

and Georgia Southern. In two of its last three outings, Alabama could have (should have?) lost to LSU and did lose to Texas A&M.

Tech's resume is far worse than that of its in-state rival and its championship outlook isn't quite as rosy, either. Still, the mere fact that a squad with five losses—including three in the conference and two in the division—is going to compete for the ACC title is an absolute miracle. "Playing for an ACC championship was

"Playing for an ACC championship was one of our goals when we began the season, so we are pleased that we will have that opportunity," head coach Paul Johnson told ramblinwreck.com. "I'm proud of our players and coaches who, when things weren't going too well early, remained focused and determined."

There is, in fact, something to be said for that. The Jackets may have taken a round-about way to reach this point, but they suddenly have two chances to post what can only be considered a successful season. Winning at Georgia or beating Florida State to take the ACC title and book a trip to the Orange Bowl would certainly do the trick. Just think of this possibility: a 7-6 team with 21-point home loss to Middle Tennessee playing in the Orange Bowl.

As they say in those ESPN commercials: "It's not crazy. It's sports."

Dawgs within striking distance of title

What seemed lost the morning of Oct. 7 has now been regained for the Georgia Bulldogs. After a 35-7 loss to rival South Carolina, the team believed that its SEC and national title hopes were dashed, but a month later that is not the case.

Since losing to the Gamecocks, the Bulldogs are 5-0 and the powerhouse of the SEC East with wins against rivals Florida and Auburn. During that stretch, they are scoring an average of 33 points per game while holding opponents to an average of 11 points per contest.

The win against the Auburn Tigers gave Georgia the SEC Eastern Division title and clinched a spot in the conference's championship game. Georgia head coach Mark Richt has gone on record multiple times that his goal for the season was to win the division and get to championship game; after that, he believes everything will take care of itself.

However, this is a team that had national championship aspirations at the beginning of the season. Winning the conference championship would assure the Dawgs a spot in the Sugar Bowl but to get to the national championship, they needed to win all of their games or receive help.

By losing to conference rival South Car-

olina, Georgia took the route to the championship that required help and help they have received. The month of November has seen the nation's top three teams at one time, Alabama, Kansas State and Oregon all lose. The losses by these three teams have catapulted the Bulldogs to the third spot in all three polls, one spot away from a berth in the BCS National Championship game.

HISTORY REPEATING ...

As it currently stands, the Notre Dame Fighting Irish occupy the top spot in the polls followed by Alabama and Georgia. For Richt and company to make the title game, all they need to do is beat archrival Georgia Tech and then defeat the Crimson Tide in the Georgia Dome. This would set up a date in Miami with the Irish.

A matchup with Notre Dame is the most likely possibly, but another national championship game that may arise is a rematch with the Florida Gators. Florida is currently ranked right behind Georgia as the nation's No. 4 team, two slots away from a spot in the title game. If Notre Dame was to fall to the USC Trojans, the SEC's top three teams would slide up one spot in the poll. This

would set up a No. 1 vs. No. 2 matchup in the SEC Championship between Alabama and Georgia. If Georgia defeats the Tide, Georgia would sit atop the polls and the Gators would seemingly be right behind in the No. 2 spot.

While there are numerous scenarios that could occur due to the chaos that is college football, the point to be taken from this is that Georgia controls its own destiny and is two wins away from a national championship appearance. Nearly two months ago, some were calling for Richt's head and the nation believed that Georgia's shot a national championship was gone. The stars have aligned for the Bulldogs since then, and it could not have happened at a better time for a team that is currently playing its best football.

TURNING POINT ...

Historically a team that has gotten stronger as the season progresses, the Bulldogs' play of late has been due to another factor as well. This factor was a prominent senior calling the team out and demanding better play from his teammates.

"We're playing too soft as a defense," said safety Shawn Williams the Monday before the Florida game. "That goes for the Dline, linebackers, corners, safeties, everybody. We're just not playing with the same attitude we were last year. I don't know what it is."

His comments charged up a defense that performed at a subpar level for the first half of the season and propelled it to the high level many expected of it. Since being called out by Williams, the team is allowing 120 rushing yards per game at a rate of 2.76 yards per carry. Before that, the defense was allowing 168 rushing yards per game at a rate of 4.05 yards per carry.

Though the difference in the numbers is staggering, perhaps the biggest change in Georgia's defense has been a consistent effort. Before Williams' rant, Georgia played sloppy first half football but would then get it together in the second half. That is no longer the case.

"I don't think it was saving the season," said Williams four weeks after ranting to reporters. "I just knew we could do it, so I just had to go out and do it."

While Williams may not think his comments saved his team's season, his coach recognized the effect William's comments had on the team on his radio show days before the Georgia Tech game.

"I think Shawn's comments certainly had a great effect on our football team," said Richt on Monday. "It jolted guys a little bit. It got some guys mad, it got some guys hurt. But I think everybody understood Shawn's

motivation, which was to play the way they were supposed to play."


All championship teams have a point where they believe they turned their season around and everything came together. For the Georgia Bulldogs, that point was just before the Florida game when one player voiced his displeasure. However, the team must recognize that there are a few more stops on its road to hoisting the Waterford crystal football. The Bulldogs need to sustain their high level of play for a bit longer.

Three teams sit ready to spoil the Bulldogs' hopes of a title: Georgia Tech, Alabama and Notre Dame. Most will look past the Jackets, but Paul Johnson's team features the nation's third-best rushing offense. Georgia just gave up 302 yards to a triple-option offense similar to that of Tech's last week and crazy things happen in rivalry games.

Alabama held the No. 1 spot in the polls for most of the season and pose perhaps a bigger threat than the Fighting Irish. Of course, Georgia will not look past the Crimson Tide. To defeat Nick Saban's team, Georgia will need to play the best it has all season on both sides of the ball. Aaron Murray will need to prove he can win the big game and Jarvis Jones will need to live in Alabama's backfield.

Georgia is two wins away from a national championship appearance and three wins away from their first title in 32 years. They still have improving to do, but for a team that seemed out of the title hunt, things couldn't be better.

Things always start to get interesting in the second round of the state football playoffs. The matchups get better, the intensity rises and upsets seem to be the norm. And this year seems to be no different from years past.

GWINNETT-HEAVY

One of the more highly anticipated secondround games comes in Gwinnett County between
two of the state's best programs. Defending
Class AAAAA champ Grayson will host North
Gwinnett in a juicy matchup that will have eyes
on it from high school gridiron fans all over the
nation. Bigtime senior prospects like Robert
Nkemdiche and DeVondre Seymour will pique
the interest of recruiting gurus.

Surprisingly, the two Gwinnett power programs have only met once on the gridiron, a 2319 Grayson win in 2010 that paved the way to
the Rams advancing to the semifinals. Mickey
Conn's program has won 10 games or more each
year since 2007 while North Gwinnett has won
10 or more each year since 2006.

There are two other all-Gwinnett duels Friday night as Norcross hosts surprising
South Gwinnett while Mill Creek hosts No. 4
seed Brookwood. West Forsyth, which has been
building under coach Frank Hepler since it's inception as a program in 2007, faces Parkview in
Round 2. The Wolverines made the quarterfinals
last season and would not be satisfied with any-

The Class AAAA slate features a bevy of metro Atlanta matchups Friday night. Allatoona travels to Hallford Stadium to face DeKalb goliath M.L. King, which has not missed a step despite seeing former coach Mike Carson resign just before the season started.

"Right this minute, all I can think about is Georgia Tech. The only thing I'm concerned about is playing Georgia Tech and trying to have a good game plan throughout the week so we can try to figure out a way to slow down that offense to figure out a way to slow down that offense and get some points on the board.

The biggest worry on the mind of Richt is defending Georgia Tech's triple-option offense. Tech has scored 143 points in its past three games, which is all the proof the Bulldogs need to see that this is not a team that should be taken lightly. The Yellow Jackets

currently own the nation's third best rushing

attack, currently averaging 325 yards a game. Luckily for the Bulldogs, this week will be the second in a row facing an option of-fense. The added experience against the op-tion attack should help the Dawgs better de-fend Georgia Tech's offense.

Also aiding the Bulldogs is the fact their defense has come alive since being called out by senior teammate Shawn Williams for its "soft" play. Since that night, Georgia has allowed 2.76 yards per carry through four games. They allowed 302 to Georgia Southern last week, 100 yards short of their season average of 401 yards per game.

SENIOR NIGHT ...

Saturday's game will also be senior night for Georgia and the last time prominent players such as Shawn Williams and Bacarri Rambo will play between the hedges. Saturday may also be the last game in Sanford Stadium for superstars Aaron Murray and Jarvis Jones. Both still have a year of eligibility remaining, but have had stellar years that may push them to the NFL.

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Jackets will play FSU for ACC title

The Braves' qualifying offer of one-year/\$13.3 million to free agent outfielder Michael Bourn was turned down recently as Bourn is reportedly seeking a multi-year deal. Atlanta has been rumored to be in the market for Cody Ross, who spent 2012 with Boston. The team also reportedly brought Tampa Bay free agent outfielder B.J. Upton in for an interview. 
LEAGUE LEADERS ...
