#### Lack of honesty taints recruiting game

Score Atlanta president I.J. Rosenberg has been working in Atlanta sports media since 1986 and continues to go through the recruiting process with his son, who was the quarterback at Centennial High School this season. He can't comment on his son's recruiting because the school he wants to attend does not confirm a player's commitment until they have been officially admitted into the school but ...

Recruiting sucks. Period. I went through it with both of my daughters who are now at UGA, but though I have covered it for many years, I have to say it is indeed a filthy business and the NCAA needs to put in some serious reforms. It won't.

It won't because college football continues to bring in the big bucks so I'm not going to even get into what they should do. They never listen.

I do, however, have some words for many of the coaches that both my son and I dealt with. How about learning how to tell the truth and treat these kids with respect?

My son, who threw for 2,300 yards and 18 touchdowns in his first year as a starter at Centennial in the top classification in Georgia, was labeled as a "tweener." A lot of FBS (Division I) and FCS (I-AA) coaches felt he had the ability to play at their level and had him on their board, but either wanted him as a preferred walk-on or weren't a fit academically.

So all along we focused on the schools up north: the Ivy League, the Patriot League and some of the top academic Division III schools.

If you think they are any different than the schools down here when it comes to telling the truth and treating the student-athletes with respect, then you are wrong. So after spending an entire year right in the middle of this process, here are my recommendations for coaches:

— First and foremost, don't lie. Look, my son is 17 and he spent an entire game keeping Milton star defensive end and now Auburnsignee Carl Lawson from killing him. He can handle, "Son, we have decided to go another way." Hey, thanks for being upfront coach.

— Second, and almost as important as No.1, return phone calls. We had one Ivy League quarterback coach that specifically flew down to meet with my son. He told him, "Yeah, we have you right at the top of our board and we are going to invite you up for a visit." This is from a coach at one of the top academic schools in the country and, you know what, despite repeated calls, emails and texts, we haven't heard a word from him. How long does it take to pick up the phone, write out a text or email and say, "We're not interested,

we have decided to go elsewhere." No problem, coach, I will focus on my other options. — Third, and almost important as No. 1 and No. 2: Check under the hood. What I mean is just because my son is white and Jewish, doesn't mean he can't run. Coaches spend so much time looking at tape, they don't get to know the kid well enough. Sure, Reuben Foster looks like a man and his tape is awesome, but he also has a three-year-old daughter and, with all the trips he has taken, doesn't seem like he has been to school at all this year. The eye test is important, but there is much more to a kid than the tattoo he has on his arm and his 40-yard speed. I swear it seems like college coaches would

Look, I might sound like a frustrated father but if everything works out for my son the way it is supposed to, he will find himself in the perfect place; most importantly, a chance to get a great education, but also play football for four more years.

rather have a kid with a rap sheet than one

that makes the honor roll.

But I will say, this recruiting stuff is for the birds.

#### A former player's look at signing day

The first time I ever heard of National Signing Day was when I was a freshman at Walton High School and I went to see my senior teammates Aaron Kelly, Hamilton Holiday and Jeff Hallen sign their letters of commitment. Kelly was heading to Clemson, Holiday to Vanderbilt and Hallen to Presbyterian College. As a trembling adolescent, the thought of a college coach coming to watch me even practice seemed more distant than the thought of graduation. I knew I wanted to play in college, but the possibility of me getting my own signing day was never going to be an option. I knew my path would have to be different.

These guys on National Signing Day were a different class in my eyes. Not only were they skilled and mature beyond their years on the field, but they were outstanding teammates. All three guys would start and finish at their schools. The Kelly's, Holiday's and Hallen's that have run their course through the college football world are the reason college programs today continue to trust the type of talent and leadership mounting in Georgia high schools today.

Fast forward 10 years later, and my view of signing day is still just as green-eyed as the first. Each 2013 signee, just as inspiring and impressive even as I am finally able to look eye-to-eye and measure up with most of them now. The heavy pressure they traversed throughout their careers earned them their scholarships. Mine would never come, but I would walk on to play receiver at UGA for

three years and got an opportunity while I was there to once again be impressed.

Each kid's path to a college locker room is different, and so was mine. I had a year and a half of college at Kennesaw State University before I was accepted at UGA. All I did for that year and a half was eat, live and breathe for training and football. When I arrived, I was finally physically mature enough to compete, two years after my graduating class's signing day. Landing on campus for the first time with me were the early enrollees that were just a month out of high school and had not even gotten to their class's National Signing Day yet.

This year alone out of east Cobb, Quincy Mauger, Anthony Jennings, Eddie Printz and Parker McLeod have taken this route and are all already at their SEC schools in winter workouts. It is becoming more and more common. Tavarres King, Ben Jones and Richard Samuels were the guys I got to see go through this challenge. Not only did they make it through the Dante's Inferno known as Mat Drills but they gained the respect of the players and coaches with how well they did. The King's, Jones' and Samuels' of the college football world are the reason early enrollment is beneficial and becoming more common.

The factor that always motivated me was

not how I viewed myself, but how I viewed myself next to scholarship athletes. I measured myself to them to find out what I was capable of. Everything I did, whether it was in the weight room or the practice field was for the sole purpose to outwork, outperform and beat them at it. It was not a chip on my shoulder as much as it was my tremendous amount respect for them as athletes and individuals.

As I got my first year under my belt, I finally got to see how recruiting played out. I remember when Aaron Murray and Orson Charles came up to Athens together on a visit. It was amazing to see how supportive and active the current players are in the recruitment process. Despite having a full plate of responsibilities, they focus on bringing in talented recruiting classes. They would offer genuine advice and support to make sure the recruits felt welcome.

After 10 years of seeing signing day evolve before me, I have learned a lot. I still see these guys in a different class than myself, However, as this year's talent disperses throughout the country I am starting to realize it is what Georgia's recruits are doing after their signing days that will continue to impress me the most.

#### **Event offers chance to celebrate future, past**

The annual rite of passage known as National Signing Day took place this past Wednesday with football prospects from across the state putting pen to paper to officially sign with various college and university football programs. The eyes of the nation rubbed any remaining sleep away when the No. 1 recruit in the country, Grayson's Robert Nkemdiche, declared on national television that he was headed to the "University of Ole Miss."

Nkemdiche's announcement got the ball rolling for everyone as fax machines started chugging along, solidifying the futures of current high school players as they look to compete at the next level.

#### **EAGLES SOARING ...**

Milton High School also got an early start to National Signing Day 2013 as nine Eagles signed letters of intent to play football at the next level beginning at 7:30. Eason Fromayan was not in attendance as he is already in Fort Worth with the TCU Horned Frogs program, but two of his fellow linemen got the Milton signing ceremony started as Josh Harris and Cory Helms inked their letters of intent to Wake Forest. Noah Allen, a defensive tackle, then signed with Army before Malik Mitchell signed

with Northern Illinois. Three Eagles would go on to become Auburn Tigers, including running back Peyton Barber and the Score Final 50 No. 1 player Carl Lawson (pictured right).

ESPNU was on hand to capture Lawson officially signing with Auburn, but before the cameras began rolling, Milton principal Cliff Jones addressed the recruits, family members and football teammates that had all made their way to the auditorium to celebrate the 12 student-athletes who would be accepting scholarships to pursue an education at the next level.

"It's an amazing smile when a student signs that piece of paper, but how many of you would be here if not for the parents in this room?" said Jones. He was quick to praise the athletes but also each's support network that helped out along the way.

#### **GEORGIA HIGHS ...**

While Milton and Grayson's ceremonies were sending countless players out of the state to pursue the dream of college football, Kell's Brendan Langley was signing a letter of intent to join teammate Quincy Mauger in Athens. The two defensive backs that helped Kell to a 10-2 season last year will now try to help the Georgia Bulldogs win the SEC

Championship Game, a feat that has eluded them the past two seasons.

Elsewhere in Atlanta, many members of the Bulldog Nation waited with great anticipation as Davin Bellamy sat down at Chamblee High School just after 11:40 a.m. Wednesday to decide between Georgia and Tennessee. The former Florida State pledge had thrown the recruiting world a curveball by re-opening his recruiting process after coaching changes at Florida State and Georgia caused him to rethink his commitment to the Seminoles.

Rumors circulated that Georgia had the inside track to land the Chamblee defensive end, but in the days leading up to National Signing Day, Bellamy noted that he liked Tennessee and even Oregon, where he visited the final weekend of the recruiting cycle.

Bellamy told those in the school's media center that he had been dealing with one of the toughest decisions in his life.

"For the last couple of days, I was getting a lot of phone calls from coaches," admitted Bellamy to reporters and others in attendance. "I just wanted to go with a gut feeling and my gut feeling told me to stay in town."

Bellamy announced his pick by pretending to reach for a Tennessee hat before smiling and grabbing the Georgia hat. The room broke into applause following his announcement.

#### THE OTHER GUYS ...

While the Kell cornerback and the Chamblee defensive end will be fine signing day-additions for the Bulldogs, each player sat beside teammates also making a college choice, though not everyone was headed to a major program.

Chamblee's other six student-athletes were headed to schools such as Presbyterian College, the University of Charleston and the Air Force Academy. Milton's other players not going to Auburn or Wake Forest were deciding to go to Northern Illinois and West Point.

Mercer will take the field for the first time this year and 15 players from across the state submitted paperwork declaring their intentions to help the program get off the ground. North Gwinnett's Michael Hayes, Johns Creek's Sam Arrington, Peachtree Ridge's Andrew Stanley and Devin Davidson and Cherokee's Tunde Ayinla were just a few of the Peach State natives to sign with Bobby Lamb Wednesday.

Georgia State and Georgia Tech also receiving more than their fair share of Georgia players. Westminster kicker Harrison Butker and Lovejoy's Travis Custis joined McEachern's Ty Griffin, Tri-Cities' Shamire Devine and Fayette County's Antonio Messick to sign with the Yellow Jackets Wednesday. Paul

Johnson got a treat when Sandy Creek's Corey Griffin and Cairo's Paul Davis were late additions to the class.

Georgia State received a stud in Kight Dallas, who committed to the Panthers out of Stephenson along with North Gwinnett's Alex Stoehr and Columbia's Mackendry Cheridor.

While college football fans so often get caught up in stars, depth charts and a recruit's ranking, it is refreshing to see a parent beam with pride, proud that his or her son was able to take his athletic talent and parlay it into a chance at a top quality education.


At Chamblee, Bellamy's uncle got up after the defensive end announced his decision and proceeded not just to congratulate Bellamy for his decision but also Bellamy's mother, who reared him as a single parent.

"I am so proud of her and how she was able to do it alone," he said. "It was so hard, but she did such a good job and look how great he turned out."

Khari Rosier's mother entertained the Chamblee crowd with a story of his first practice and how he wanted to quit, but she wouldn't let him. The inspirational story brought goosebumps to the room and Rosier embraced his mother afterwards with a hug that earned a round of applause.

National Signing Day proved once again to not just be a glorious hope of what could happen in the future but also a celebration of the efforts put in by the student athletes and their families in the past.

For years, some of the nation's best female swimmers have called Georgia home, including Olympians Amanda Weir, Kathleen Hersey and Kara Lynn Joyce. Once again, swimming orthwise the state of the control of the contr enthusiasts will turn their gazes towards the Georgia Tech Aquatic Center to see another class of young ladies set fire to the pool and blaze their way to state titles.

CHANGING WINDS ...

Ever since the GHSA split the swimming and diving championships into two separate classification brackets, the highest classification title has been handed back and forth between Fulton County (Chattahoochee, Centennial, Northview), Lassiter and Brookwood. The Broncos won last year, ending Lassiter's run of four straight titles, to give Brookwood its fifth title since 2001. Lassiter has won five titles since the split and Centennial. has won five titles since the split and Centennial, Northview and Chattahoochee all have claimed one since 2000.

Brookwood recently finished second in the Gwinnett County championships, as Mill Creek ran away with the title. Brookwood lost several key contributors from last year including Kelsey

Gouge, but coach Greg Puckett has senior Rachel Muller back.
"Muller should be one of the favorites in the 200 free and 500 free." Puckett predicted.
Muller beat fellow Bronco Anna Jahns in the 200 freestyle and 500 freestyle at the Gwinnett County championships. Muller finished second in the 200 free last year and third in the 500 free.

Mill Creek lacks the individual standouts of

Mill Creek lacks the individual standouts of years past such as Rachael Dudley (2012 100 butterfly, 100 backstroke champion) and Frederique Lefebyre, but look for the Hawks to once again lean on their depth and their incredible diver Lexi Sachse, who won the Gwinnett diving title.

Meanwhile, Lassiter will look to rebound after falling in the Cobb County championships.
"I know that all of our girls are excited about (the championships)," Lassiter head coach Lauren Barnes said. "The second-place finish to Walton at the Cobb County Championships has helped nump them up."

Lassiter will be led by Jordan Drake, Lauren O'Malley and Lexi Glunn.

"Jordan Drake is a fierce competitor,"

Barnes said. "When she gets in the right mindset, nothing can shake her confidence in a race. Lauren O'Malley possesses a lot of maturity for a sophomore. She is a leader of the team and she motivates others with her grace and positive attitude."

Postoll missed the Cobb County championships, but the Lady Mustangs still managed to finish third. Postoll's sister, Melissa, was a force in the pool, taking the 100 backstroke and 200 freestyle events. The Mustangs will also be a threat on the diving board as Alex Hart recently set a new school record at the Cobb County championships. She finished second last year to Colquitt County's Elizabeth Kirkland in the one-meter dive.

SMALL, BUT MIGHTY ...

While the A-AAAAA competition includes schools with some of the state's smallest enrollment numbers, plenty of standouts will be ready to compete. Wesleyan recently finished fifth at the Metro Atlanta Swimming and Diving Championships. Rachel Koch was one of the standouts for the Wolves, taking the 100

butterfly. In last year's championships, Koch finished fifth in the event.

The defending champion Westminster Wildcats ended Marist's run of five straight last season, but Westminster owns 20 crowns since 1963, including a run of six straight from 2001-2006. The Wildcats enter with some momentum after beating out Marist and Woodward Academy in

the Metro Championships.
Puckett came away impressed by Westminster's Niçole Stafford at the Maddie Brown In-

"(She) should be the favorite in the 200 free and 100 butterfly." Puckett said.

Woodward Academy will look to exact a measure of revenge after recent losses to Westminster. #### **Coaches discuss Tech's pool, titles**

There is something special about this pool at Georgia Tech. While there are many tremendous pools around the state that host high school events, the trip to the westside of Atlanta for the state finals is always different no matter how often teams come here.

Having the state championship at Georgia Tech is awesome," Parkview coach Jack Gayle said. "Tech is one of the best pools in the country. The guys walking into Tech and seeing the stands and the all the people up there gets them pumped up mentally.

After a season full of important meets, teams that made it to this weekend know how important the state finals meet is.

That's the meet that matters," Marist coach Terry Blish said. "All the other meets are designed to prepare for that and to get people qualified to swim in that.'

Blish and Gayle would know about state championship meets. While Blish has won four boys state titles at Marist in his career, which began at the Dunwoody school in 1973, Gayle has won three boys titles at Parkview since he

became head coach in 2004 and was a member of two state championship teams at the Gwinnett program in 1995 and 1998 as a swimmer.

#### **KEY PLAYERS ...**

According to the Score Atlanta/GPB swimming and diving polls, the Parkview (Class AAAAAA) and Marist (Class A-AAAAA) boys teams are each ranked at the top of their respective classes. However, that does not always mean success in the state meet.

"We've had many upsets in the years that I've been involved," Blish said. "Some would say we've pulled a few of those upsets. It's very often billed as an upset. We've had years when we weren't the heavy favorites and others where some have said the only way we'd

lose is if we got lost on the way to the pool."
While Parkview is defending its 2012 boys title, the Panthers know what it is like to be the underdog chasing the team with the proverbial championship belt.

"Last year, we had been second two years ago, and I know that weighed heavily

on (the team)," Gayle said. "Our theme was 'V for vendetta,' and they had kind of a mission. That was a big motivation, whereas this year, being the defending state champions is a lot more difficult because everyone is looking to you to perform.

Parkview and Marist certainly have the talent to live up to the expectations No. 1 teams have in this meet. The War Eagles will rely on a mix of veterans and underclassmen this weekend, as seniors Will Herbert and Takunda Mafundikwa lead the team in the relays while junior Braxton Young will be counted on in the 50 and 100 freestyle races. Freshman Christian Lorys has recovered from an illness that sidelined him in the Metro Meet finals two weeks ago, a meet Marist lost by one point to the Westminster boys.

Speaking of the Wildcats, Westminster freshmen twin brothers Derek and Erek Cox will swim in a variety of events, mostly relays and sprints. No. 2 Wesleyan, meanwhile, is anchored by sprinters Luke Hedrick and Drew Middleton.

Parkview, the defending boys state champion and current Gwinnett County champ, is led by seniors Nathan Jones, Dillon Kasson and Rory Martin. Alpharetta, the No. 2 team in the state, will provide strong competition as will Cobb County powers Walton and Lassiter, which are ranked third and fourth, respectively.

Walton, the Cobb County champ, and the Lassiter will attempt to bring the first-place trophy back to Cobb, where it hasn't been since 1999 when Pope won it. A Gwinnett program has won each title since in the state's largest class. Nathan Hufnagle led the Raiders

to victory two weeks ago at the county meet, where he won the 100 breaststroke and 200 IM, while the Trojans boasted strong performances by Zach Bunner (100 backstroke, 100 butterfly), Jimmy Yoder (200 freestyle, 500 freestyle) and Daniel Bridgers (50 freestyle, 100 freestyle).

#### AS IT WERE ...

Parkview has been on fire lately, beating rival Brookwood in a head-to-head meet, then winning the county meet. The Panthers, it seems, are swimming their best at the right time of year.

"Yeah, I think so," said Gayle when asked if his team was peaking. "I think a lot of it is that we're really fortunate to be able to swim (against) our great rival Brookwood at the end of the season and go right into the county championships. I think that really helps our swimmers and the Brookwood swimmers because its a great 'pump-up' meet that gets everyone really excited.'

While the Panthers are trying to defend their state title from 2012, Marist will try to win its first boys state championship since 2009 and seventh in school history. Wesleyan is two-time defending Class A-AAAA champion. Westminster, meanwhile, will attempt to bring home state hardware in the boys meet for the first time since the Wildcats won six straight from 2003-2008. Walton won the championship in 1983, while Alpharetta and Lassiter are each looking to win state gold for the first time.



These are tough times for the Atlanta Hawks right now. Their January campaign featured a season-ending loss of Lou Williams and a 7-9 record. To say February has not made things any better would be an understatement. "I'll play anywhere," said Upton on a conference call. "He's (Jason Heyward) got the hardware. 
after being shutout the previous night by the same Stingray team.

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
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
