What is amazing to consider is that Georgia was within a Kentavious Caldwell-Pope dribbling error (at Vandy) and a made Donte Williams alley-oop (Ole Miss) from being 10-6 with two additional road victories. The Dawgs have also seen two other leads slip away in the final minute against Alabama and Arkansas.

On Tuesday, the free-agency period for the NFL begins and Falcons fans are anxious to see what moves the Birds make especially with the team releasing Dunta Robinson, John Abraham and Michael Turner.

The reason the Falcons released the three key veterans is they had to free up cap space. Tomahawkers look for life after Chipper

This is a monumental spring training at Disney's Wide World of Sports for the Atlanta Braves. With Chipper Jones no longer manning the hot corner or providing the veteran leadership in the clubhouse, Fredi Gonzalez is looking for a player or two to replace these two openings, not to mention fill in for his production in the lineup. Frank Wren brought in lots of new pieces to reshape the team from a year ago without taking away from what was already present.

BROTHERS BRAVE ...

Through free agency the Braves added B.J. Upton from the Tampa Bay Rays, making him the highest paid free-agent in Atlanta Braves history with a five-year, \$75.25 million contract. Upton had a down season last year, but the Braves see his potential and look to harness it starting in the preseason. Once he signed with Atlanta, he began politicking for his brother to join him in the Braves' outfield. This dream became a reality when the Braves and Diamondbacks swung a seven-player deal, sending Justin Upton to the National League East. The downside of this trade is sending fan-favorite Martin Prado out

to Arizona after not being able to agree on a long-term extension in the offseason.

With an outfield of B.J. and Justin Upton to go along with Jason Heyward, the Braves feel that they have one of the top outfields in all of baseball. They are also hoping that this new-look outfield will give the lineup a new dimension to mask the hole left by Jones' retirement. With three players who have the potential to put up 30 home runs and 30 stolen bases, Gonzalez should have more flexibility in his lineup to protect his run producers and get them pitches to hit.

Over at third base, Jones' replacement is a little less determined. As it stands, there is no leader between Juan Francisco and Chris Johnson to take over the reigns. Right now, they are both hitting around .360 and have each driven in four runs. Johnson has two homers to Francisco's one. Defensively, many believe that Francisco holds the advantage, which the spring numbers back up. If neither man asserts himself as the leader going into April, Gonzalez will probably look to go with a platoon, allowing an optimal lineup to be out there each night.

Dan Uggla has been an enigma since he

came to Atlanta and signed an extension. He has been primarily below average in his production at the plate since his arrival, but he has had hot stretches where he has been as productive as any hitter in baseball. This season could be a make-or-break year for Uggla, and if he doesn't improve, the Braves may look to make a move to upgrade their overall lineup. His double-play partner will also be eyed closely, but mostly to judge his development as an offensive player. Andrelton Simmons is already one of the top defensive shortstops in baseball. Across the diamond at first, Freddie Freeman is looking to take the next step in his offensive game. His batting average took a hit last year, but he led the Braves in RBIs and could do so again this year with all of the table setters in front of him in this lineup.

The leadershipi role of the Braves following Jones' retirement will fall to Brian McCann. He is now the longest-tenured position player on the Atlanta roster. He will start the season on the disabled list, but should return following surgery in the offseason on his shoulder to repair a partially torn labrum. This surgery will allow for more fluid movement in his shoulder, which should bring back the offensive production expected of the lefty slugger.

MOUND MEN ...

Pitching is also something that will be monitored closely this spring since there will be an open spot in the rotation. During the offseason, Jair Jurrjens was let go and Tommy Hanson was traded to the Angels for hard-throwing reliever Jordan Walden. The rotation right now consists of Kris Medlen, coming off one of the most dominant stretches by a starting pitcher ever, Tim Hudson, Mike Minor and Paul Maholm.

As for the battle for the final spot in the rotation, the Braves are hoping Julio Teheran takes the position and runs with it. So far this spring, he has tossed five innings, giving up one run on the only hit he has surrendered all spring, a homer to Bryce Harper. It appears that he is far and away ahead of the competition at this point. J.R. Graham is also getting a look this spring and has thrown five shutout innings in three appearances.


A name that has not been mentioned yet is Brandon Beachy, who is projected to come back from Tommy John surgery around the All-Star break. He was arguably the best pitcher over the first half of the season last year until he went down with his injury and will likely reclaim his spot in the rotation once he is healthy again. This is not a bad problem to have if you are the Braves, who have had

some key pitchers go down with injuries the past few years.

Arguably the strongest unit on the team is the bullpen. Anchored by Craig Kimbrel, the staff features Jonny Venters, Eric O'Flaherty and Jordan Walden. This will be the third year in a row that the Braves will feature one of the top bullpens in baseball, and this season it is widely regarded as the top unit. Kimbrel was far and away the best closer the past two years in the league. Coming off a truly dominant season, Kimbrel may garner some attention in Cy Young conversations throughout the season.

The Braves made some noise this off-season with their signings and trades while trying to keep up with their new rivals in the nation's capital. This new-look Braves team has the potential to put up strong power numbers, but with that power will come lots of strikeouts. What the newly reconstructed lineup also brings is more balance, a change from the heavy reliance on lefty hitters in years past. This season will feature the future of the Braves and the future looks bright. The excitement surrounding Disney should follow the Braves up north to Atlanta for the season opener April 1.

Defending champs return looking for more

If several of the teams in this year's GHSA basketball finals look familiar, it is because they are. Five defending champions have made the finals yet again as well as five more than captured the GHSA's top prize in either 2010 or 2011.

The Miller Grove boys and girls are both back trying to repeat as are Columbia's boys and girls teams. The Miller Grove boys program has won four straight titles and now is seeking a AAAAA crown to make it five in a row. The Columbia boys are right behind Miller Grove with three straight and seeking a fourth in Class AAAA after moving up from AAA.

Norcross pulled off a sweep in 2011 and has both teams ready to play for the Class AAAAAA titles. Dating back to 2006, the Norcross boys have captured four titles. Jesse McMillan was at the helm two years ago and has this squad playing incredibly well since the end of football season when reinforcements arrived to help the Blue Devils. The Norcross girls, meanwhile, won back-to-back titles in 2010 and 2011 before falling just short last year.

Greater Atlanta Christian is back in the

GHSA finals after losing to finalist Manchester last year in the quarterfinals. Eddie Martin's Spartans won the Class AA title in 2010 before successfully defending the title in 2011. Despite most of the important players from the last title team no longer roaming the halls of GAC, Martin has plenty of firepower with Collin Swinton and Isaiah Wilkins hoping to help the Spartans' head coach earn his third title in his first five years with the program. Martin also won three titles with Norcross before finding his way to GAC.

Wilkinson County captured the 2011

ing his way to GAC.

Wilkinson County captured the 2011
Class A title on the strength of 11 seniors and a trio of juniors. After graduation gutted Aaron Geter's team, he has managed to rebuild around another talented senior class mixed with sophomore Torrico Simmons.

In 2010, the Southwest DeKalb girls won the program's third straight AAAA title. After a down year in 2011, Southwest DeKalb reached the finals last year before falling to Miller Grove. Now, the Panthers are back and ready to exact some revenge for the championship game defeat from one year ago.

TALENTED TEAMS ...

The Miller Grove girls aren't anxious to give up the title of champion just yet, especially to Region 6-rival Southwest DeKalb. Kathy Walton's Panthers got the better of Renee Breedlove's Wolverines in the region tournament after falling to Miller Grove three times earlier this season. Many of the players that competed in last year's AAAA finals will be going at it again this year, including Miller Grove's Tashi Thompson, Katie Hunt and Klarissa Weaver as well as Southwest DeKalb's Deja Clay and Calyn Kelly.

Columbia, coached by Chantay Frost, went 24-5 last year to win the program's second title in three years and, this year, Columbia (26-3) has battled through Pickens County, LaGrange, River Ridge and Jonesboro to reach Macon. Senior Miah Spencer and junior Yaktavia Hickson both tasted a championship last year and will be inspired to try to pull off the repeat bid.

Tahj Shamsid-Deen of the Columbia boys will try to leave the Decatur school with four state titles to his name before suiting up next year for Auburn.

Weslevan also has a host of players that

year for Auburn.

Wesleyan also has a host of players that will be playing women's college basketball next season, but first, a shot at history is at stake for Jan Azar's Wesleyan program. The last girls program to win six straight state titles was Hart County (1989-1994). Wesleyan cap-

tured the 2008 Class AA title before winning the last four Class A crowns. With reclassification shifting schools into different classes, Wesleyan is back in Class AA looking to bookend that 2008 title with a record-tying sixth. If not for a loss to Greater Atlanta Christian in the 2007 state finals, Wesleyan would be chasing its 10th straight crown.

ALL EYES ON WHITE ...

While Wesleyan is trying to match a record Miller Grove is angling for a fifth straight crown, which would break the tie that the Wolverines currently share with Westover (1990-93). Head coach Sharman White has seen some incredible talent during this current run, but had to replace five retries for left very left. some incredible talent during this current run, but had to replace five starters from last year's team. He didn't have a bare cupboard as eight players returned from last year's team and he was the beneficiary of playing in the alwaystough Region 6-AAAAA.

Dating back to 2004 when Mays won the first of two straight, the last nine AAAA champions came from what is now a loaded Region 6-AAAAA.

While many familiar faces will be in Macon this week, there is still room for new blood and that is what the other teams such as Gainesville, Dawson County, St. Pius X and Randolph-Clay, among others, are hoping for this weekend.

Cream rises to top after semifinal showdowns

The Norcross Lady Blue Devils thumped Langston Hughes from the opening tip en route to an easy 64-16 victory in the Člass AAAAAA semifinals at Georgia Tech. Diamond DeShields had 21 points as Norcross advanced to the program's third finals appearance in the last four years. In the other semifinal showdown, North Gwinnett raced past North Cobb 57-40. North Gwinnett holds a 2-1 edge over Norcross this year with the most recent victory coming in the Region 7-AAAAA tournament finals.

Defending Class AAAA champion Miller Grove will have a shot at the AAAAA title after a 49-23 win over Effingham County. Southwest DeKalb will await Miller Grove after edging past Forest Park 43-41 at Kennesaw State. Southwest DeKalb had to rally back from 12 points down in the third quarter. The Southwest DeKalb/Miller Grove final will be a rematch from last year and the fifth time these two teams have met this season. The Panthers defeated Miller Grove for the Region 6-AAAAA title two weeks ago.

Defending Class AAA champion Columbia will be seeking a third title in four years after a five-point win over Jonesboro at Fort Valley State. The Eagles will face Sandy Creek for the AAAA crown in Macon.

SENSATIONAL SOPHOMORE ...

Asia Durr was the story for St. Pius X as the Golden Lions slipped past Chapel Hill 59-51. Durr, a 5-foot-9 sophomore, finished with 27 points as Kyle Snipes' team reached the finals for the first time since 2007. St. Pius X will face a Dawson County team looking for the first title in program history.

Wesleyan will play for a sixth straight state title, which would tie a GHSA record set by Hart County (1989-1994) after the Wolves whipped Thomasville 83-34 in the semifinals to earn the right to face undefeated Laney in the AA finals. Weslevan has lost just once to a Georgia opponent, falling 49-46 to Southwest Atlanta Christian.

Perhaps no team was more impressive over semifinal weekend than Southwest Atlanta Christian, which shut down Holy Innocents' from the first quarter on in a 78-43 victory. St. Francis fills out the other slot in the Class A-Private bracket after a very impressive 50-27 victory over Calvary Day. This is St. Francis' first trip to the state finals.

CHASING HISTORY ...

Junior Kyle Castlin led Hillgrove with 20 points to help the Hawks beat Wheeler and clinch their first-ever trip to the finals. Facing Hillgrove in the Class AAAAAA finals will be Norcross, which clinched its sixth finals berth in nine years (according to the Georgia High School Basketball Project) with a narrow win over North Cobb. Brandon Goodwin scored 22 points and made eight of 10 free throws down the stretch.

Miller Grove made quick work of Northside-Columbus, leading 30-15 at the half and then dominating the second half. Keith Pinckney had 20 points and seven rebounds for the Wolverines. Gainesville will oppose Miller Grove in the AAAAA finals and will attempt to prevent the Wolverines from winning a GHSA-record fifth straight state title.

In Class AAAA, Columbia returns to the finals looking for its sixth state title in eight seasons and fourth in a row after dominating Statesboro at Fort Valley State in the semifinals. Coach Kerry Sandifer's squad got 32 points from senior point guard Tahj Shamsid-Deen, an Auburn signee.

Bleckley County will face GAC for the

AA boys title as the Spartans look for another championship after winning state titles in 2010 and 2011. Coach Eddie Martin's Spartans outlasted defending champ Laney in the

semis as junior forward Isaiah Wilkins had 16 points and 14 boards and senior point guard Collin Swinton scored 14.

In the Class A-Private finals, Greenforest Christian will face St. Francis in the finals after hanging on to beat Athens Christian. Senior center Tosin Mehinti nearly had a tripledouble with 12 points, 17 rebounds and nine blocks for Greenforest.



For all its pomp and circumstance, the NBA trade deadline came and went with Josh Smith still in Atlanta. Long rumored to be making what would have been the biggest midseason deal of the year, the Hawks instead kept their mercurial, do-it-all for-

ly I can accomplish more things in this league. I just have to stay healthy and stay positive."

HOT HORFORD ...

Smith may be the biggest name on the Hawks' roster and he certainly stole all of the headlines in Atlanta last month, but it's Al Horford who continues to quietly go about his business as the team's best player. Prior to Monday's setback at Denver (in which Horford still managed an impressive double-double of 18 points and 13 rebounds), the former University of Florida star scored at least 20 points in nine consecutive games dating back to Feb. 11. Interestingly, the streak was preceded by four straight contests in which Horford did not reach 20 points. Horford boasts six double-doubles in his last 10 outings and the stretch includes a 34-point, 15-rebound eruption in the victory at Utah.

Falcons to revamp their talented core

The Falcons' dismissal of three veteran start-Lers last week shows that the organization's top priority continues to be building its roster through the draft above all else. General manager Thomas Dimitroff and head coach Mike Smith have shared this mantra of drafting the core of the team and developing the "in-house talent" into capable starters for bargain contracts. Fifteen of the Falcons' 22 consistent starters last year were draft picks and 10 of the 15 came to Atlanta after Dimitroff took control in 2008. The releases of Michael Turner, Dunta Robinson and John Abraham frees up three starting jobs, three roster spots and, more importantly, the combined savings will gives \$15.9 million plus an additional \$2.4 million after the NFL raised the salary cap to \$123 million.

With some breathing room under the salary cap, the Falcons can now look to reach deals and keep their top free agents. Sam Baker, Brent Grimes and William Moore are priorities right now and should benefit from the extra spending money. It looks like the Falcons

will re-sign Baker, but Moore is going to have a much stronger market when free agency opens. Moore was Atlanta's second-round pick in the 2009 draft and is coming off a Pro Bowl season. Grimes was out with an Achilles injury for all of the 2012-13 campaign and has had two injury-plagued seasons in a row that enable him to be re-signed at a lower price.

The greatest consideration will be on building the defension gide before the season.

building the defensive side before the season starts. Replacing John Abraham, who holds the franchise record for most career sacks with 68.5, is just one of the necessary steps. The Falcons only had five linebackers on their active roster last season and Mike Peterson is likely going to either sign with a new team or retire. If the draft does not offer a capable linebacker or a free-agent stud like Oakland's 28-year-old Phillip Wheeler could be on the Falcons' shopping list. Wheeler played at Georgia Tech and played at Shaw High School in Columbus.

The Falcons have had internal discussions about defensive end Osi Umenyiora who is expected to be dealt a contract in the ballpark of four years, \$20 million. Sager can

Gattis is also making a strong case to be the third catcher for the team should the team decide to carry a third catcher. He could also be sent down then recalled for use as a DH when the team goes to interleague play. Pastornicky has made a case for the infield supersub with his bat over Ramiro Pena, who many outsiders believed had the inside track coming into spring thanks to his glove. Blake DeWitt appears to be out of the race.


